The Initiative

The Coming of the Blessing® is a March of Dimes initiative for American Indian and Alaska Native families.

We provide prenatal education, training and resources that encourage women to include traditional beliefs, lessons from their ancestors and their partners in their circle of support during pregnancy. This circle of support can help women make

healthy choices for themselves and their babies.

This initiative was created by the March of Dimes West Region American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) Women's Committee. The committee is



chaired by Margaret Anne YellowKidney, a women's health nurse working for Indian Health Service on the Blackfeet Reservation in Montana. Committee members represent 10 different tribes from 10 states. The women believe that we can give babies a fighting chance by honoring the strong culture and traditions of Native people.

Results of The *Coming of the Blessing®* pilot project were
